'Who Am I?' Resource Pack: Introduction

The 'Who am I?' project started in February 2009, when Gender Matters set up a working group to look at producing a resource to support schools in teaching about trans issues and people. It was felt at that meeting that one of the reasons that schools are wary about teaching about this topic is a lack of confidence and information among teachers (and more generally in society). This creates a vicious circle, as lack of education about gender variance creates a lack of understanding in society, leading to widespread discrimination and harassment of this group.

Pack Development

The pack was launched on15th February 2010 in Wolverhampton with well over 85 people attending the event. However we are keen to improve and develop it over the next few years, informed by the experience of teachers using it in the classroom. The Bigger Picture

The Qualification and Curriculum Development Agency (QCDA) identifies three overarching curriculum aims¹. These are to enable all young people to become:

- Successful learners who enjoy learning, make progress and achieve
- **Confident individuals** who are able to lead safe, healthy and fulfilling lives
- **Responsible citizens** who make a positive contribution to society

Alongside these aims, everybody working with children and young people is required to help them achieve the five Every Child Matters (ECM) outcomes:

- Stay safe
- Be healthy
- Enjoy and achieve
- Make a positive contribution
- Achieve economic well-being

According to the support group Mermaids² 'gender variant children and young people are often deeply unhappy'. Guidance on transphobic bullying written by the Gender Identity Research and Education Society (GIRES) asserts that 'transgender people continue to experience widespread discrimination in the educational environment, in the workplace in society generally', and points out that the stress experienced by gender variant young people is severely aggravated by bullying. This combination of internal confusion and external pressure means that young trans people are among the most vulnerable in our schools, with exceptionally high rates of suicide and self-harm. Under the Education and Inspections Act 2006, schools have a duty to protect pupils from all forms of bullying, including transphobic bullying.

So in order to work towards the three main curriculum aims and achieve the ECM outcomes for gender variant children and young people, not to mention young

people with gender variant parents, carers or other family members, we believe it is essential to teach all children at least some basic information about gender variance. Among the key points we feel it is essential to get across, both to young people and to education professionals, are:

- Gender variance is a naturally occurring phenomenon, not a lifestyle choice
- **4** There are trans people within every culture and have been throughout history
- Gender identify is quite distinct from sexual orientation; it is about who you are as opposed to who you are attracted to
- It is unacceptable to subject trans people to bullying and harassment
- It is against the law to discriminate against trans people
- Bullying and harassment of trans people is illegal and treated as a hate crime
- There are support services available for trans people

The teaching materials in this resource pack are focused on three curriculum areas: science, citizenship and history. For each subject at least one lesson plan has been provided, which starts with links to the aspects of the National Curriculum that seem most relevant to a study of gender variance or of trans people.

Science

Schools will decide how the resources in this pack best fit into their curriculum. However we would recommend if possible that the science materials are taught first, so that young people have a basic understanding of what gender variance is before going on to think about the history and the rights of trans people.

The main resource for science teachers in this pack is a PowerPoint presentation with extensive notes for teachers. The notes are provided separately as well as on the PowerPoint slides. This presentation was originally written by Samantha Neish, a Wolverhampton science teacher, and has also benefitted from the input of Bernard and Terry Reed from GIRES.

Citizenship

The materials we have included in the Citizenship section could be used in various other curriculum areas, for example PHSE, English or Religious Studies. The main resource included in this section is a short DVD entitled 'Who Am I?' This was specially commissioned by Gender Matters from Zip Theatre and written by Jon Lingard-Lane. Zip Theatre did a lot of research and consultation with trans people and their families while developing this film, and all the events it depicts are based on the real life experiences of people they talked to. A transcript of the film is included, as well as some teaching notes. The content is quite hard-hitting and for this reason we recommend that it is shown to Year 10 or above after completion of topic areas in Science and Citizenship.

Any use of the DVD outside of this structure should be in a controlled discussion to ensure negative experiences do not occur from both the perspective of any trans students you may have in your group, or potential bullies that may decide to harass trans people. The aim should be to reduce fear of harassment to trans people by pointing out the impact bullying may have on their life.

The other resources in this section, written by Ruth Wilson, are intended to look at the rights of trans people in the wider context of human rights and equality more generally. For this reason the lesson described has information and case studies relating to disability, gender, race, sexual orientation, religion or belief and age as well as trans equality.

History

The key resource in the history section is the large wall chart entitled 'Historical Time Line', designed and researched by Larna Gallier. This timeline has three elements:

- Key events in the history of trans people
- Key events in British history
- Key events in the development of human rights and equalities

In addition to the timeline, the history section contains resources for two lessons, one where students create their own timeline of trans history, and the other where they do a mini-research project about a famous trans person.

Two possible opportunity for teaching these lessons might be as part of a school's celebration of LGBT (Lesbian Gay Bisexual and Transgender) History Month, which takes place in February each year or the other in November which is anti bullying week.

This however should not limit the use of this pack in any way, we would encourage its use at any time of the year.

Ordering the pack

We are going through a process of showing potential customers the pack and taking orders, however payment should not be made until you receive an invoice from Gender Matters when the pack is ready to be sent out.

The Secondary School Teachers Resource pack should be ready for distribution in April 2010 and will be available to anyone who is interested in purchasing a copy and is suitable for anyone working with young people over the age of 14.

Support

Gender Matters are able to support any activities with workshops at reasonable cost.
